An Arts And Culture First

Irish America's Aos Dána - artists and actors, poets and performers, step-dancers and scribes - will be feted this Friday April 23 at the inaugural Irish Echo Arts & Culture Awards.

The virtual event (from 6 p.m. Eastern) will pay homage to forty honorees who used Irish arts and culture to keep spirits high during the first long year of the pandemic. There will be a special shout out for literary luminaries, novelist Alice McDermott from Washington, D.C., and poet Thomas Lynch from Michigan.

The recipients of the Irish Arts & Culture Medal represent a veritable who's-who of Irish American endeavor including singer Ken O'Malley of Los Angeles who has staged a free virtual concert every Sunday for the past year; Megan Derrig, occupational physiotherapist from Chicago who uses Irish music to empower older people; Tony Reilly of Portland, Maine, founder of the American Irish Repertory Ensemble, whose recovery from a horrific road crash inspired a one-man play; Elizabeth Stack of Albany, NY, who led the move of the Irish American Heritage Museum during the worst of the pandemic and ensured activities continued unabated over the past year.

Another honoree will be the incomparable

Malachy McCourt, who will be presented with the Seanchaí Award.

Guest speaker at the event will be Democratic Congressman Conor Lamb from Pittsburgh, a tireless advocate for all things Irish American. Tickets (\$9) for the Arts & Culture awards can be obtained via our website at www.irishecho.com where you can also vote for your Arts Hero of the Pandemic. Voting closes at noon on Friday, April 23.

Sponsors of the event, which will be coordinated from studios in Ireland, include Foras na Gaeilge, Ancient Order of Hibernians, Irish American Partnership, Culture Ireland, Aer Lingus, and the NI Bureau. Special awards from Foras na Gaeilge, for the person or group which did the most to promote the Irish language during lockdown, and from the AOH for the best community-orientated nominee, will also be presented.

Said Irish Echo Publisher Máirtín Ó Muilleoir: "Over the past year, our artists across the U.S. stood between the Irish American community and the Covid-19 chasm.

"Their determination and exuberance in these most testing of times pulled the community through. This Arts & Culture celebration allows all of Irish American to acknowledge their tireless efforts and to thank them for keeping spirits high." The awards will be highlighted by a special supplement that will appear in next week's print issue of the Echo out on Wednesday, April 28. The supplement will also be posted live at www.irishecho.com this Friday, April 23, in conjunction with the online event.

CAITLIN WARBELOW

Profession: Violinist, fiddler, and entrepreneur. In non-Covid times, I'm the violinist/fiddler for the Tony Award-winning Broadway show "Come from Away". In March 2020, my partner Chris Ranney and I founded Tune Supply (https://tune.supply) to keep the traditional music community vibrant, supported, and connected, and to keep traditional musicians working, during the pandemic.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? While my career used to be primarily focused on my own performances in various venues, since the pandemic started it has been increasingly focused on using what resources I have to keep the trad music community going as a whole. This has involved a lot more logistical and managerial work, and a lot less playing, unfortunately!! But through it all, I've managed to keep leading virtual sessions every week (66 so far), as well as



performing on virtual concerts and teaching group and private classes. But what I'm most proud of is the work that Tune Supply has done to help others continue to practice their art. It's been near impossible for performing artists and session musicians (whether they are

professional or not!) to continue doing what they do (and paying the bills) when all venues are closed, and pubs aren't holding sessions. My creative energy during the pandemic has shifted away from personal performance, and towards building platforms, networks, and



opportunities so that we all can continue to play and enjoy music while physically apart.

riginally from Alaska, Caitlin now serves as the violinist/fiddler in the Tony Award-winning Broadway musical "Come From Away". An All-Ireland winner and New England Fiddle Champion who holds degrees from Columbia University (M.S., Urban Planning) and Boston University (B.A., Anthropology and B.Mus., Violin Performance), Caitlin's expertise lies not only in music, but also business and activism. Caitlin is on the faculty at the Irish Arts Center and the Swannanoa Gathering and maintains a private teaching studio. Caitlin performs as a symphony soloist and with numerous ensembles including Warbelow Range. With Chris Ranney, Caitlin is a co-founder



ALEX BOATRIGHT

Profession: Performing artist, teacher, and Artistic Director of the Baltimore-Washington Academy of Irish Culture.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? I have been teaching groups, private lessons, and festivals all via zoom until recently when we could do door to door mini concerts outside with the BWAIC students.

I founded the nonprofit school (BWAIC) with Mitch Fanning during the pandemic to provide the local kids with Irish language, dance, and music classes in a central space and to provide them with instruments to try for free via coordinating an instrument library for them.

Most of my quarantine work has been facilitating learning despite the circumstances online- whether adults or kids, groups or solo.

ashington DC based concertina and harp player, Alex Boatright, is the Artistic Director of the Baltimore-Washington Academy of Irish Culture. BWAIC is a non-profit school dedicated to creating equitable access for all children and teens to Irish music and cultural classes on all traditional instruments no matter their cultural, racial, or economic background.

Alex has been active in creating spaces for the FairPlé movement in the USA and facilitating a lens that applies directly to benefiting marginalized US students and teachers.



KYLE DARCY

Profession: Profession: Producer of vivid colorful pictures inside people's minds using only black ink on white paper.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? The pandemic prevented the release of UNDER THE IMPRESSION from being promoted with book signings and public library events. Fortunately, however, supporters of literature and the arts, such as the IRISH ECHO have done an awesome job elevating the KYLE DARCY brand. Receiving this award is truly humbling, because the worthiest recipients are the hard-working staff of the IRISH ECHO.

yle Darcy was born and raised in Belfast, Northern Ireland, but has called Boston, Massachusetts home for over thirty years. His 2010 debut novel, UNDER CURRENT CONDITIONS, made the BOSTON GLOBE BESTSELLERS LIST and created a loyal fan base with an appetite for more. Darcy's responded in June of 2020 with the prequel. UNDER THE IMPRESSION. Darcy's 2020 novel, UNDER THE IMPRESSION, begins in the waning days of World War II, as a group of Nazi elite escapes to South America. The gripping and fast paced narrative weaves through decades and continents into the worlds of drug cartels, terror organizations and intelligence communities. The story is a prequel to Darcy's debut novel, UNDER CURRENT CONDITIONS, which made the BOSTON GLOBE BESTSELLERS LIST.



HELEN O' LEARY

Profession: Artist and Professor of Art PSU How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? I am currently in central PA, where I teach and sometimes live, having moved here from Jersey City last March. I have spent Covid living in my barn, and making pigments and dyes from plants within my immediate environment. I grew an extensive dye garden and am exploring sustainable materials for my practice. I have used the lockdown to immerse myself into the work, and to explore rural PA for content. Lots of exhibitions have been cancelled, my gallery in NY closed permanently, but I am working towards shows in NY this summer, solo at Patricia Sweetow in San Francisco in the fall, and Limerick City Gallery in 2022. I am very much looking forward to

being able to travel home once all of this is behind us.

elen O' Leary was born in Wexford she attended NCAD and earned a BFA and MFA at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, IL. Every Sunday since lock down began, Chris Cooke hosted a weekly virtual Irish session. This includes local musicians as well as several regular guests that join us from Cape Cod, Seattle, South Carolina, Washington and California. Musicians Tommy Kegan, Charlie Muse, Alan Baker, Paul Davis and others have been of great help with the session and also allowed me to post videos of them playing sets of tunes which have been helpful to musicians that are new to Irish music.

His live performances included: his band playing with the local Irish Dance school for a driveway show for a 90th birthday party this summer, performed live/streamed concert at ball field for Irish Fest in the Forest, played for Thanksgiving Turkey Drive at D's Bottleshop, St. Patrick's performance at Yacht Club beverage house and St. Patrick's Day performance at Retirement Community, I will be performing for the Irish Arts and Culture Day in High Point, NC.

On top of this, Chris used his computer talents to assure a successful National Convention for the Ancient Order of Hibernians in American, one of the first major online events of the pandemic. Since then, he has managed over 20 webinars including Book Reviews, Irish American Heritage Month events, Freedom for all Ireland events and more.

"Ireland Unfree Shall Never be at Peace"

JEAN HANEY

Profession: Co-founder of Visual Integrity, a software company specialized in PDF and graphics technologies.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? For the Irish, St. Patrick's Day is the most anticipated celebration of the year. In 2020, it was the day that the world went dark. Parades were canceled, doors shut and people isolated in their homes. With all our plans for inperson events scrubbed, the Maine Irish Heritage Center needed a plan to weather the pandemic while staying connected to our community. As "the hub for all things Irish in Maine", we needed new ways to keep our Irish culture alive in Maine. We also needed to replace our primary fundraiser – the Claddagh Award, an in-person award banquet, with something equally effective. Our answer - a Livestream variety show -"The Best of All Things Irish in Maine

2020" which aired 11/22/2020. It was a hit with our community but importantly, more it extended our reach dramatically while also exceeding fundraising expectations. Since then, we have produced a fun 2021 St. Patrick's Day Parade with the Irish American Club of Maine as well as a segment for the Irish embassy's "Shades of Green" St. Patrick's Day program. Personally, this has been exciting for me because I am able to combine my graphics and technology skills with my passion for Irish culture while working with an amazing team

volunteers. It's been deeply satisfying to see how well-received our digital offerings have been and I expect that they have a regular spot in our events calendar even after all pandemic restrictions are happily lifted.

efore starting Visual Integrity, Jean spent 10 years working in technology companies driving product strategy, developing strategic business alliances, and marketing all types of software solutions. While living in Amsterdam during the '90s, she co-founded Visual Integrity which has become a leader in PDF conversion and creation solutions for developers. Today, living in Maine, she still actively manages the company, while also devoting volunteer time to help the Maine Irish Heritage Center navigate the virtual pandemic through programming, web-based membership and donor management, and collaboration tools so the team can work successfully from home.



MEGAN DERRIG

Profession: I am a licensed and registered occupational therapist. Currently, I work in an assisted living facility where I empower older adults by motivating them to achieve what they once perceived impossible. As an occupational therapist, I help people engage in daily activities that are meaningful to them so that they can lead meaningful and purposeful lives. These activities can range from teaching someone how to get dressed, to improving their fine motor skills so that they could start knitting again.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? I routinely use music as a way to connect with my clients and elicit positivity in such discouraging times. As you may imagine working closely with a vulnerable population, the facility has not allowed any visitors since the pandemic's beginning back in March of last year. This isolation, while extremely important to keep residents safe, has provided little to no opportunities to connect with the outside world.

Several of my clients are of Irish descent and they have beautiful landscape pictures of Ireland all around their room. In addition, many of the clients have some form of cognitive deficit or dementia. Frequently I would ask questions surrounding their upbringing, or trips to Ireland to foster a therapeutic relationship. However, oftentimes their responses to my questions were limited as they simply could not remember and did not have their loved ones around to remind them. For instance, one day I was working with a client and she had mentioned her family being from County Mayo and I immediately reached down for my phone and began playing the song Green and Red of Mayo by the Saw Doctors. Once the music began playing, her eyes lit up and I watched her travel back in time to life before the coronavirus. While she did not remember the lyrics to the song, the hope, and joy that the song elicited truly evolved into the backbone of my treatment interventions. Her daughter was incredibly thankful for my ability to give her mother the opportunity to connect back to her cultural heritage and reminisce on old memories



these unprecedented times, many of my clients have struggled to find meaning and purpose throughout their daily routine. Irish music has been an essential motivator as it elicits positive memories, reduces stress, and allows me the opportunity to connect my clients to the outside world.

egan Derrig is a first-generation Irish American who grew up in Chicago, Illinois. Her father and all four of her grandparents were born and raised in Ireland. Megan graduated with a Master's degree in occupational therapy from Xavier University in 2019. Her passion for occupational therapy stems from her innate desire to help others achieve their goals and live meaningful lives. Currently, Megan works with the older adult population in an outpatient rehabilitation setting. She is extremely grateful for her Irish heritage as it has frequently helped her foster therapeutic relationships with many of her clients.



CHRISTOPHER COOKE

Profession: I am a Health IT professional with experience working with numerous Electronic Medical Record Systems (EMRs) and Practice Management Systems. I currently work as an Automation Architect for a software company specializing in behavioral and mental health.

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? Since the first week of the pandemic, I have run a weekly Virtual Irish Session over Zoom. We initially tested some programs like JamKazam to try and play together in real-time. Unfortunately, we found that we could not reliably get a connection with a low enough delay for the group to play together so we have stuck with using Zoom with each person taking their turn leading a song or set of tunes while everyone else follows along on mute. While we all miss being able to hear the whole group play together this format actually works pretty well with a Session since you normally have a leader for each tune that everyone else is following.

I also started a YouTube channel NCIrish to post videos of songs and tunes played by me and other local musicians and to help promote Irish Culture and History in North Carolina where I live.

Ewes Tree, the Irish Folk Band I play in, has meet



regularly to practice. The four of us in the band are all members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) as well as the Knights of Columbus. We are very blest to have an outdoor pavilion available to us at our Knights of

Columbus Hall which has allowed us to safely meet in person to play music together. Thanks to the rollout of the vaccine, we were recently able to play for a retirement community on St. Patrick's Day which just happened to fall on the 2-week mark from their second vaccine shots. Another highlight for us this year was getting together with the Irish Dancers from Triggle Academy of Irish Dance to put on a driveway concert for a 90th Birthday Party.

I've been able to participate in some online streamed events including the Irish Fest in the Forest and the High Point Irish Arts and Culture Day concert. I also gave technical assistance for the Home for Christmas Virtual Concert put on by the Hudson Valley Irish Fest.

Over the last year I have been learning to play the highland bagpipes. With help from Joe Brady of Wake and District Pipes and Drums we are in the process of starting a new Pipe Band in Wake Forest, NC called an Gorta Mor Memorial Pipes and Drums.

hristopher Cooke is an Irish Musician originally from Fishkill, NY who now lives in Wake Forest, NC. He is a singer and multi-instrumentalist and plays with Ewes Tree Irish Band and is a member of the An Gorta Mor Memorial Pipes and Drums.

He is a proud member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) and is currently the AOH State President for North Carolina and serves on the AOH National Board as the Digital Coordinator.









CHRISTINA SCHAUDEL

Profession: Academic Advisor for the Arts and Humanities. Adjunct Professor with the Performing Arts Department

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic?

hristina is a proud member (and alumni) of the SUNY Rockland Community College faculty and administrative staff. She graduated with her MFA in Acting from the Actors Studio Drama School at Pace University and will be starting her Doctoral Studies in Educational Leadership in June. She is an ever-constant advocate for the arts in education and continues to speak about the importance that the arts have in our everyday lives. She is first generation Irish- American, as her mother Mary hails from Co. Kerry, Ireland and serves as a key member of the Irish Heritage Committee at RCC.







CIARAN O'REILLY

Profession: Theatre Producer/Director/Actor

Cavan, He co-founded The Irish Repertory Theatre, a New York institution serving 50,000 people annually, where he works as Producing Director actor and director. He has produced nearly 200 plays and musicals.

Ciaran has been honored with several prestigious theatrical awards including Drama Desk, Drama League, and the Eugene O'Neill Lifetime Achievement Award. President Michael D Higgins presented him with the Presidential Distinguished Service Award in 2019. An avid motorcyclist, he has made solo trips around the world and from the Artic Ocean to Tierre Del Fuego in South America.

HILARY BEIRNE

Profession: Chief Administrator, New York City's St Patrick's Day Parade

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? It has been difficult to operate what is considered the largest cultural Parade in the world during the pandemic. Because of the pandemic, we dramatically increased our use of social media. We ensured the tradition of the Irish marching on the streets of New York City every year since 1762 (259 years) remained intact. This was done by organizing two symbolic parades in 2020 and again in 2021 with members of the parade board, parade committee, essential workers, first responders, and the 69th Regiment.

In 2021, due to NY State covid-19 health guidelines

which resulted in the inability to host any large-scale event, we produced not only the symbolic parade on March 17th honoring First Responders & Essential Workers, we also produced a virtual parade, a virtual journal, hosted a one-hour show, launched a social media St. Patrick's Day greeting campaign, and live-streamed the symbolic parade. All of these events were hosted on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and our newly redesigned website. The live-streamed symbolic parade alone was viewed by 198,000 with approx.



50% of the comments on March 17th coming from Ireland. In January, the Parade produced a one-hour TV show with the Catholic Faith network featuring the 2021 honorees which were broadcasted on local TV channels multiple times in March, in the lead-up to the parade in the New York area. All in, we amass a worldwide audience of over 500,000 across all media platforms. Because of the inability to host a large-scale parade, we diverted our efforts towards increased engagement of technology and social media, this was necessary in order to engage our traditional audience, but also it was done to increase the parade's profile and engagement with the younger generation. Engaging the younger generation at this level (technology wise) will ensure the future of the Parade for many years to come.

ilary Beirne hails from Boyle, Co Roscommon. As the Chief Administrator of the Parade, he ensures the operations of the world's largest and oldest

cultural Parade run smoothly every March 17th. Under his direction, the Parade has increased its engagement of technology and social media while maintaining the traditions of the Parade stretching back 259 years. With a team of dedicated volunteers, he coordinates the marching sequence of the parade, parade events and is responsible for press and social media announcements, and all Parade's publications.

Mr. Beirne is also the Chairman of the St Patrick's Day Foundation, NYC.

DARRAH CARR

Profession: Artistic Director of Darrah Carr Dance and Assistant Professor in the Conservatory of Dance at Purchase College, SUNY.

How have you continued to practice your art

during the pandemic? Darrah Carr Dance has

persevered in creatively and successfully pivoting their public performances, Arts in Education workshops, and Community Outreach programs to the online environment during the pandemic.

While maintaining a focus on their signature style of ModERIN – a unique blend of traditional Irish step and contemporary

modern dance - the company also explored new themes of urban and rural environments given that their dancers were

quarantined in many different places throughout New York City and the tri-state area.

Darrah Carr Dance shared pandemic projects widely on both national and

international virtual platforms presented by Irish Arts Center, Tune Supply, Irish American Writers & Artists, Dancer from the Dance Festival of Irish Choreography curated by John Scott, and Cáca Milis Cabaret at Wexford Arts Centre with Banshee, among others.

Meanwhile, Darrah Carr Dance's virtual performance during the Irish American Writers and Artists Transatlantic Salon was hailed by The Irish Echo as "during the lockdown, the company shot individual videos of their roles in backyards, parks, and apartments, demonstrating the power of dance to uplift in any setting." As Darrah Carr Dance pivoted to virtual performances, the company maintained focus on Arts in Education and Community Outreach programs with the goal of producing virtual events that are family friendly and readily available online.

Last October, Darrah Carr Dance filmed a socially distanced version of their Arts in Education lecture demonstration program at the Sugarloaf Performing Arts Center in order that they could continue their extensive work with K-12 schools through the rosters of Young Audiences New Jersey and Siegel Artist Management.

Artistic Director Darrah Carr was invited to share her experiences with transferring the company's Arts in Education programs to the online environment during a presentation at the virtual National Dance Education Organization Conference in October. The company also transferred lecture-demonstrations on the history and contemporary practice of Irish step dance to the online environment with presentations over Zoom for New York University, Coffeyville Community College, Fei Tian College, and Warwick Center for the Performing Arts, among others.

While Darrah Carr Dance eagerly awaits the return to live performance and in-person teaching, the company will continue to rely on the power of dance to uplift spirits and to carry us forward.

arrah Carr Dance itself is a Bessie-Award nominated Irish dance company based in New York City that specializes in ModERIN: a unique blend of traditional Irish step and contemporary modern dance. Performance highlights: "Good Morning America," "The Today Show," Carnegie Hall, Irish Arts Center, Irish Repertory Theatre, Duke Theater, New Victory Theater, Jazz at Lincoln Center, Celebrate Brooklyn, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, MASS MoCA, The Yard, and Dublin's Project Arts Centre. Artistic Director Darrah Carr, PhD, MFA, is an Assistant Professor in the Conservatory of Dance at Purchase College. Darrah Carr Dance is represented exclusively by Siegel Artist Management.





arcus Robinson is from Belfast, Northern Ireland. He studied modern languages at Cambridge University and then lived in Paris for 16 years where he




specialized in architectural photography. His work was recognized for its unconventional and painterly qualities.





How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? Like so many, I've transferred my onstage life to an online screen, but I will say that I am both grateful and inspired by the work I've seen all around the Irish community. As President of Irish American Writers & Artists, I've been enormously proud of the hard work by the Board and the Membership to keep our work engaged and our spirits lifted. We began with a Virtual St. Patrick's Day 2020 that successfully grew into "Dancing At The Crossroads," an ongoing platform for members of the Irish community to submit their creative work: the "crossroads" were our social media sites where our community shared writing, recorded and live performances, and artwork. In true IAW&A seanachi spirit, we created a landing page for the Irish diaspora from Rome to California (and everything in between). At the same time, we continued to produce our twicemonthly salons - now on-line. Over several months, IAW&A also launched several special events including Irish Cawffee Tawk, an informal members' gathering, The Fortune Society's "The Castle," featuring a talkback with Malachy McCourt and WBAI's David Rothenberg, and a St. Stephen's Day Salon with special guest Phil Coulter. And in January, Vice President Brendan Costello and I were featured in the "Producing in A Pandemic" segment of Origin Theatre's 1st Irish Festival.

Most significantly, we were able to produce our yearly fundraiser, the Eugene O'Neill Lifetime Achievement Award ceremony, honoring the actress and writer Kate Mulgrew. All of this required enormous creativity, flexibility, and humor as we navigated our way, filming segments outside in Times Square, at Rosie O'Grady's in midtown, in Connolly's West 46th St. second floor bar, and outside my front stoop on the Upper West Side.



While proud of my leadership role at IAW&A, one of the most personally satisfying aspects of these endeavors has been the opportunity to continue practicing my craft as an actress and writer. Early in the pandemic, I sang a few bars of "She Moved Through the Fair" for the Irish Rep's "The Show Must Go Online," filming myself in the woods behind my NJ grade school. (I had temporarily relocated to care for my parents, who had to get used to having a singer vocalize in the house again!) I was also happy to be cast as Carole in an original monologue by playwright Sheila Walsh for one of the IAW&A salons, and as Dr. Kathleen Lynn in Thom Molyneaux's "Women of Kilmainham." I acted in Turlough McConnell's "Eugene O'Neill: An Irish American Boyhood" alongside Ciaran Byrne and Colin Ryan, and I performed my original piece "You Make Me Feel Like A Natural Woman in A Pandemic" at an IAW&A salon. I later used that piece to create a poem for the SAOL Project in Dublin's "Poems in a Pandemic - Photographs in Sisterhood" in celebration of International Women's Day.

Currently, I am working on 7-minute musical

vignette with my good friend Deborah De Furia, a screenwriter based in Rome. Our tiny musical tracks our pandemic moments as longtime friends. The piece, which we will also perform, is part of a longer musical that a group of Brown University theatre alumni are co-writing as an on-line benefit for The Actors Fund. This evolved out of an informal reunion of students who attended Brown in the late 80s and 90s. Many of us had not seen each other in person since graduation, so the pandemic did in fact bring many former friends back in touch.



Actors Neil O'Shea sent "Irish Writers Perform" from Irish Writers Museum. "The Playwright and Actor Perform" was zoomed in only to Cincinnati from Dermot Bulger Director/playwright/writer/poet and Ray Yeats Actor/ Irish Arts Officer Dublin City. Michael James Ford and Barbrie NiChaoime delivered an absolutely brilliant



adaptation of Oscar Wilde's "The Happy Prince" & "The Selfish Giant" and added a Q&A live conversation about their work with our community, and John McDonough from Irish American Writers and Artists NYC filmed and presented virtually "Off the Meter and On the Record" on our Big Screen and by "home Delivery" then answered questions at the end of the play. Additionally, we promoted and recommended Plays presented by Fishamble, Dublin, Irish Rep Theatre NYC, Druid Theatre Galway, and others.

When outdoor space was safe, we set up outdoor

stages and hosted "drive-in your car for outdoor concerts" with; The Drowsy Lads, The Lost Celts, & FinTan plus we created "Sundays in the Garden" featuring live music during good weather. We added to our visual arts collection the original American edition of The Book of Kells

We planned the recent St. Patrick's Day starting with a Mass, followed by 6 rooms spread for social distanced spaces, all preregistered, wearing masks, following rules using hand sanitizer for safety. We showcased local live musicians, dancers, pipers and St Patrick himself who told his story, and offered catered meals that were pre ordered and served inside sanitized boxes.

This resulted in 'constant contact' which made a significant impact on our viability through increased donations and membership retention.

The New York Studio of Irish Step Dance Profession Owner, The New York Studio of Irish Step Dance

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? The New York Studio of Irish Step Dance has been committed to keeping its students and community at large engaged and entertained throughout the pandemic.

The school wanted to lift everyone's spirits by sharing how dancers celebrated

their St. Patrick's Day seasons socially distanced in both 2020 and 2021 via its #HowDoYouCelebrate initiative and encouraged students to submit photos and videos for its "25 Days of Irish Dance" Instagram challenge. It also encouraged its dance family to host Instagram Takeovers - with students taking control of the school's social media account for the day and sharing their talents with the dance community.

The school hosted virtual holiday showcases giving students the opportunity to perform at home

during the Halloween, Christmas and St. Patrick's Day seasons to songs of their choice - from Thriller, to Deck the Halls, to Tell Me Ma - with peers, friends and family tuned in from across the country to watch. Despite being physically apart, St. Patrick's Day was another success - entertaining crowds virtually either live or via prerecorded group footage for CraicFest, Irish Network NYC, Irish American Association of Westchester and The Alzheimer's Foundation of America, among others. The school also taught Irish dance virtually to companies like nonprofit One to World. The first-ever Irish

Dance Day on September 17 was another big hit featuring six dancers taking over the school's Instagram stories in addition to the day starting off with a half-hour Insta Live fitness session.

The school continues to offer online classes via Zoom. Prior to the pandemic, all students were based in New York. Since launching online classes, the school has steadily gained new students nationwide and as far away as California. It has also offered multiple Insta Live sessions from its own community teaching dance and yoga as well as a personal Trooper Fitness trainer.





Irish Step Dance has been committed to keeping the tradition and entertainment of dance going this past year and will continue to do so as NYC returns to normalcy.

he New York Studio of Irish Step Dance is located in NYC and currently offers online classes. When it reopens its physical doors, it will do so at its home location in the Upper West Side of Manhattan. All students are welcome any time of the year wanting a challenging but enjoyable workout. The owner Soraya Hanzus created an environment focused on fun and fitness for adults - from ages 16 to 60s. The school's dancers have performed for business leaders and live on national TV. Bill invited Tami Ellen as his guest to that year's SSPD Party at Old St. Patrick's Cathedral, and that started their Irish step dance that led to Tami Ellen joining the foundation nearly one year ago. Tami Ellen is also a member of the Irish Business Organization of New York Executive Board, Membership Officer, and Chair of the IBO-NY Women's Networking Committee

How have you continued to practice your art during the pandemic? Our SSPD Mission Statement and Core Values provided us with the inspirational roadmap, and our team of marketing, web, social media, and video production experts made it possible to take our 10th Anniversary Celebration online and share our YouTube Premiere with a global audience on March 17, 2021. EAMONN WALL







At 18, Sean began his adventure by moving to England to complete his apprenticeship. After six years, Sean decided to make the move to America.

Sean's only dilemma upon his arrival was...should it be Pittsburgh or New York? But after a visit with his cousin Austin McGreal, fate intervened in that decision

'There's so much suffering'

The Catholic Church lost an opportunity to speak out on the issue of suffering during the pandemic.

That's the view of leading American novelist Alice McDermott.

"Honestly, Joe Biden has come as close as I've seen to someone in the public eye speaking of the spiritual aspects of this thing we've just been through," she said.

"I suppose that there have been individual sermons that have been given," said McDermott, whose entire family came down with Covid in December. "But the public face of the church has been more about objecting to shutting down Masses than offering spiritual consolation, at a time as a society, as a world, we really need it.

"We need to be reminded of what's at the heart of our faith and here we're arguing 'let's crowd in a few more people because we're not getting the collection money."

The alleviation of suffering or what we do with suffering, she said, hasn't been addressed.

"We can't avoid it — isn't that the Christian message? The Catholic message is what we gain from suffering," she said.

Instead, the Washington-based McDermott has detected a "kind of indifference to the suffering of others."

She added, "I'm dismayed as an American how little our obligation to one another seems to figure in so many people's consideration.

"Even now, I can't believe we're not outraged enough," said McDermott, whose most recent novel, the acclaimed "The Ninth Hour," features an order of nursing sisters working in early 20th century Brooklyn.

Getting sick, which the family did together, "brought another reality to it," she said.

"I guess having been through the virus personally and seen my kids go through it, it's not just the death toll, there's so much suffering," she said. "This is a really awful virus that makes people very, very sick and makes their deaths and their illnesses really terrible.

"I just don't see enough of that in the public discourse," she said. "We need a little bit more keening."

The National Book Award-winning novelist found in 2020 that she had to turn to reading poetry and plays for sustenance.

"When things were really awful in

New York, our three kids live in Brooklyn, with all the stress of that, hanging on to Gov. Cuomo's words through the worst of it last spring, I found for the first time since I've been literate that I just couldn't focus on long works of fiction, on reading," McDermott said. "My solace for all my life has been going to novels and I found that very difficult."

Fiction, as it happened, had been one source for her awareness of the last pandemic — specifically, the title work in Katherine Anne Porter's collection of short novels "Pale Horse, Pale Rider," which dealt with the suffering caused by the great influenza at the end of and after World War I.

Another was McDermott's knowledge that her own maternal grandmother, who was from Bundoran, Co. Donegal, succumbed to the flu on Manhattan's Upper West Side in March 1919, even though in their Irish way the family always said she died of pneumonia.

McDermott's other grandparents were from Mayo, Cork and Kerry, and it was when discussing immigration that the novelist referred to the nation's "spiritual malaise."

She said, "Our obligation is to the

sickest among us, to the poorest among us. We are one of them, in some way, or may find ourselves one of them.

"Immigration has always been a difficult, complex problem for a country like the United States, but one we are morally obliged to address rather than just dismiss, because it's not us, it's them.

It's amazing and ironic and sometimes stupefying that a country of immigrants could turn so readily turn against the next wave of people who are only looking for what we've been given," McDermott said.

From Michigan to Moveen West

On July 31, 1936, a priest, the Rev. Thomas Patrick Lynch, died in Taos, N.M.

A reporter from Santa Fe wrote: "Two years ago, the young Irishman from Detroit had made the journey up to Taos for the first time. Full of hope he was starting his life's work in the missionary parish."

Katharine Darst described the sad funeral procession down the mountainside, and what she saw on the way to the Cathedral of St. Francis of Assisi in Santa Fe.

"But nowhere was there a Willa Cather to mark the passing of this boy. She who had felt so poignantly the death of an old archbishop with his life work accomplished, was not here to witness the infinitely more pathetic exit of this boy whose life had been shut off 'ere half his days were done.' Here was a sorrow which needed her pen, and alas, only I was there."


Darst sent a copy of the article to the priest's brother, Edward, in Detroit.

If the death of a young priest was noteworthy enough for his Irish family, it would take on added significance. For Edward Jr., who at age 10 was the only child pictured in a large group at Fr. Lynch's ordination in Detroit, would at 12 wander into the basement of a funeral home to see his dead uncle being dressed in a fresh white alb and green chasuble in preparation for the wake that night and 10 o'clock Mass at St. John's the next morning, Thursday, Aug. 6, 1936.

"That vision — a young boy's witness of a dead priest and living men lifting him into the casket — shaped his life and my life and my family's life for going on seven decades now," according to his second son writing in the early years of the 21st century.

Instead of becoming a priest himself, Edward Lynch Jr. followed his true vocation, and most of his nine children followed him into the business he founded.

Thomas Lynch, the son named for the priest, has been a funeral director in Milford, Mich., since 1974. He is also in the "poetry

business," as his cousin Nora Lynch, of Moveen West, Kilkee, Co. Clare, used to say. He happily embraced the two vocational identities, and also took easily to being Irish as well as American.

In the first case, having an interesting day job only raised his profile, especially in the early 21st century when the HBO drama "Six Feet Under," set in a familyrun funeral home, was a hit with viewers and critics alike. He'd written two books — "The Undertaking: Life Studies from the Dismal Trade" and "Bodies in Motion and at Rest: On Metaphor and Mortality" — that the show's creator Alan Ball admired.

"These two collections of essays about life as an undertaker gave me a sense of the tone I wanted the show to have," he said, calling Lynch a "brilliant, soulful writer."

"You funeral types have always understood," Ball told him in an

email. "Once you put a dead guy in the room you can talk about anything."

Lynch also understands that his own tribe have a particular affinity for the process: "For the Irish and Irish-Americans, the only spectacle more likely to bring out a crowd than a blushing couple at the brink of their wedding is a fresh corpse at the edge of its grave."

'Sentence commuted'

As for that second coupling of identities, by the time he wrote "Booking Passage, We Irish and Americans" (2005), he had more than paid his dues in his ancestral land, having been coming and going for 35 years.

"In the late 1960s, my life was, like many American men my age, up for grabs," Lynch writes. A draft lottery was held on the first day of the last month of the decade. Sept. 14 was the first date drawn. "Men born on that day were going to war," he says. His birthday, Oct. 16, wasn't pulled out at 254. "It was like a sentence commuted," he recalls. "I was free to go.".

He would not be sent off to an unwinnable war. Instead, the 21-year-old asked his widowed grandmother for the address of her husband's relatives in Ireland, folks she'd dutifully sent Christmas and Easter greetings to every year. They were the "distant old-country cousins," who were mentioned in their prayers:

"Tommy and Nora Lynch on the banks of the River Shannon. Don't forget."

The brother and sister were both unmarried and the end of the line. Tommy was to die in 1971, the year after he met his American namesake in person. Nora lived on another 21 years, during which time Lynch was witness to a radical transformation within the cottage's walls, though the landscape would largely stay the same.

In time, Thomas Lynch became next of kin to Nora, his first cousin, twice removed.

Circumstances can make that connection a close one, because, first of all, it involves two siblings. In this case, Nora's father was Sinon, and the brother who left and settled in Michigan was Tom, father to the priest, and greatgrandfather to the poet.

I can relate. Mary, my great-grandmother, raised her eight children in Dublin, my mother's father among them. John, Mary's brother, was father to eight children on the farm in West Clare. Their first-born daughters were educated and accomplished — Mary's Kate had an important clerical job and John's Mai was a nurse. These cousins, both single, could be trusted one summer during World War II to bring safely an extroverted 7-year-old Dubliner down to the farm in West Clare. The child, my mother, was enraptured by her three weeks there, and talked about that vacation and all subsequent vacations and trips until the day she died in 2019.

Mai would become godmother to my sister, her little first cousin, twice removed. Mai's brother, Michael, was my only relative in New York when I arrived in 1993. And a welcoming one he was, too,

Part of my West Clare family's story involves Loop Head. John and Mary's grandmother was from a house just beside the lighthouse and she walked barefoot the 12 or 14 miles inland on her wedding day. Her elderly descendants referred to her in the late 20th century as the "woman from the west."

Lynch mentions Loop Head, of course, and the Victorian resort Kilkee and the old market town of

Kilrush. But it's the family homestead that has pride of place in his heart.

"Nora Lynch's house, four generations removed from the young man who left there in 1890 and who started our family in America, fills me with a sense of the grandeur of Time," he wrote in a long letter to Síle de Valera, a government minister and a local member of the Dáil, after Nora's death.

The Land Commission had made Nora a squatter on her own land under pressure from local "grabbers" and "blackguards." It would eventually be resolved, with the land going to a couple she was close to. Thomas Lynch, meantime, had inherited the cottage, which had been a wedding gift in the era of the Famine to "our common man," as he called their shared male ancestor, Nora's grandfather, Pat Lynch, who died in 1907 when she was 4 or 5

Luxury lost

Lynch writes: "Can the bigger picture be seen in the small? Can we see the Western World in a western parish? Can we know the species by the specimen?" Well, not so much really, for the book tends to focus on and reflect a particularly Irish-American sensibility.

"It was in Moveen I first got glimpses of recognition, moments of clarity when it all made sense my mother's certain faith, my father's dark humor, the look he'd sometimes get that was distant, unknowable," preoccupied, "And Lynch says. mv grandmothers' love of contentious talk, the two grandfathers' trouble with drink, the family inheritance of all that."

A couple of decades on, when his brother came to help him with Nora's funeral, he was able to view this with a certain distance: "Ireland happened to Big Pat in 1992 the way it happened to me in 1970, as a whole-body, bloodborne, core-experience; an echo thumping in the cardiovascular pulse of things, in every vessel of the being and the being's parts, all the way down to the extremities."

Lynch recalls about Pat, "'Oh God,' he half-sobbed through the shambles of his emotions, 'to think of it, Tom, the truth and beauty of it.'

"I remarked to myself, given

that the brother and I were both occupationally inclined to get through these solemnities while maintaining an undertakerly reserve, I thought his emotings rather strange."

At the heart of all this is a search for authenticity.

"Instead of Methodists or Muslims, we are golfers now; gardeners, bikers, and dead bowlers," Lynch writes, "The bereaved are not so much family and friends or coreligionists as fellow hobbyists and enthusiasts."

He adds, "And I have become less the funeral director and more the memorial caddy of sorts, getting the dead out of the way and the living assembled within a theatre that is neither sacred nor secular, but increasingly absurd—a triumph of accessories over essentials, gimmicks over the genuine. The dead are downsized or disappeared or turned into knickknacks in a kind of funereal karaoke."

Lynch had been thinking for a while about writing a sort of "Roots" for the Irish,

celebrating those who left and those who stayed. Then all changed the year he began writing it. After 9/11, Americans had lost, he says, the "luxury of isolation and purposeful ignorance of the larger world of woes, a taste for which I'd protected acquired in my youth suburban and overindulged throughout my adulthood—fattening, Americans especially do, on our certainty that it will all be taken care of by whoever's in charge."

Much later in another context, he discusses certainty, or certainties, and someone being in charge and "watching out for the likes of me."

He says, "But faith, it turns out, is not child's play, seasoned as it must be by the facts of life — love hurts; we die; hope falters; God, it seems, goes missing sometimes.

"This is where the smarmy and narcissistic doxologies of the day fail us. Faith is not for dealing with God's grandeur — the sunset, the candle flame, the child's face. God is manifest in a lover's eyes. Faith is rather for the hours of God's absence, when we are most alone, betrayed, in pain, afraid."

Lynch has great affection for the old-school priests of his youth, like family friend Fr. Thomas Kenny, who was from Galway.

On her deathbed his mother "saw Fr. Kenny, dead himself for fifteen years, coming to take her by the hand into heaven. She saw him plainly, called him by his name, and smiled beatifically when she told us about it all."

Fr. Kenny had retired just as the Vatican II reforms were being discussed in the American church and went home to Ireland. "He found the Irish Church much as he's left it years before—much as I'd found it in 1970, established, in charge, completely enmeshed with the life of the nation, and its people."

Lynch seems less impressed with the latter-day priestly caste, or at least not with the first-name accessibility and the fashion fails and the scandals, accompanied by a doubling down on certain aspects of doctrine. "Divorce and abortion and contraception would seem, I am not the first to say," he

writes, "odd topics for manly celibates to get so embroiled in."

He recalls an encounter with a young English priest of Irish parentage on the island of Iona. The American traveled up on impulse when on a trip to England. "I'd always wanted to see this place," he says.

He revealed to his new acquaintance that Mary, whom he'd married recently, was caring for his four children back home in Michigan. No, his first wife was not dead, and, no, he'd never gotten an annulment. And he went to describe the idyllic relationship with Mary and some of the details of their wedding.

"'Of course, that was only a "civil" marriage,' Fr. Peter said.

"'Well, that would be an improvement on the one before,' I told him."

There are other great lines like that and some memorable paragraphs.

Here is Thomas Lynch on the attitudes to weather in the corner of the world he made his parttime home: "'Grand day, thank God,' is what they mostly say, grateful to be up and out in it. Or 'soft day,' or 'it's very broken.' One rarely hears the out-and-out complaint that the weather in West Clare is severely damaged compared to, say, Cuba or Connecticut, or Melbourne, or East Clare, where trees can stand and gardens thrive and people can go about their business."
