Law and Order Reaches Thirteen

Law and Order has arrived at the number thirteen and Irish luck duly kicks in.

The Irish in law enforcement is an American story. Indeed, it is the stuff of American legend. The American Irish may not be as proportionally numerous in law enforcement as they once were, but you will still find great numbers of them serving in the front lines, and every rank at local, state, and federal level.

The Irish beat cop is still out there, and behind him, or her, is a heritage that goes back to the earliest days of what we would recognize as the beginnings of modern law enforcement.

The Irish Echo, in its nine decades and four years of covering its own beat, has more than once touched on the story of the American Irish and their outstanding role in keeping the citizens of the United States of America safe.

But it's only in recent years that we have formally acknowledged what has truly been a cornerstone in the evolution of our democracy, and the building of a society based on a foundation of impartial law and civic order.

For the Irish Echo to honor Irishborn and Irish American men and serving in enforcement and the prosecution of the law is a most appropriate and natural thing to do.

And we are very proud to have been doing it for thirteen years by way of the Law & Order Awards, and indeed all our 94 years whenever an appropriate story

In recent years we have been especially proud to be honoring the prominent and expanding role of women in the law and order community.

A thirteen year anniversary gathering at Rosie O'Grady's is but our latest salute.


Our first Law and Order list was compiled in 2009 and was headed by then NYPD Commissioner Ray















But there would be one the following year when inaugural formal gathering would allow honorees from all over the

United States to meet, mingle, and compare their experiences. And they did so at a reception hosted by the Irish Consulate in Manhattan.

Dublin-born John Timoney, who had served at the very top level of policing in New York, Philadelphia and Miami, was a chief honoree that year.

We lost John in 2016 but his service to three great cities, and his adopted country, is now enshrined in the great Irish American law and order story.

At the 2017 awards we also saluted the dedication, courage and legacy of Detective Steven McDonald. Steven, too, will be forever remembered for his courage, dignity and grace, and at that 2017 gathering we were honored to present an award to Steven's son, Sergeant Conor McDonald.

In 2011, the Consulate again played host to the awards and Yonkers Police Chief Ed Hartnett was a chief honoree. After two years, the Law and Order listing, and the reception now attached to it, was attracting a growing level of interest from around the country.

The 2012 awards reception was scheduled for the fall of that year. But Superstorm Sandy had other

So the 2012 Law and Order Awards gathering was held in the first month of 2013. This would be a full dinner affair at Rosie O'Grady's, and New Rochelle Police Chief Patrick Carroll would be a chief honoree.

The new placing on the calendar would be maintained and the awards event held in the early days of 2014 would return to Rosie O'Grady's where all in attendance cheered the first woman top honoree, Deputy Chief Theresa Tobin of the NYPD.

2015 saw a top honor being bestowed on NYPD President Pat Lynch, who later in the year went on to win reelection to his leadership position.

In 2016, Law and Order reached a milestone in that chief honoree, Bernie McCormack, became the first federal law enforcement officer to win the accolade.

In 2017, we presented a Lifetime Achievement Award to Lieutenant Colonel Callahan of the New Jersey State Police. Callahan would soon command the force by virtue of being promoted superintendent.

A highlight of the 2017 awards

was an address to the gathering by NYPD Commissioner James O'Neill, then in the early days of presiding over a department that would record the lowest annual homicide rate in New York City in modern times. It was again so in 2018.

In 2019, the awards paid particular tribute to women in law enforcement. In 2020, and before pandemic restrictions brought an end to large scale gatherings, honorees included Commissioner Dermot Shea, a proud son of Irish immigrants. 2021 would see a Covid-induced delayed gathering, held in May and in Rory Dolan's of Yonkers. Now, for 2022, we make a return to Rosie O'Grady's.

All our honorees are recognized not only for their hard work and dedication, but also because they are the present day embodiment of the proud legacy of the Irish in American law enforcement and public safety, a legacy that reaches from the distant past into the boundless future.

Place of Birth: Liberty, NY Where you live: Liberty, NY

Job Title and Description: New York State Trooper since Sept. 27, 1993; President - NYS Troopers PBA since Aug. 1, 2009; Chairman - National Troopers Coalition since 2021.

Why I chose this career: I joined the NYS Police to be part of the one of the most prestigious law enforcement agencies in the country and nothing is more satisfying to now be able to further the working conditions and benefits of the men and women of this great organization.

The proudest moment of my career: Helping make the NYS Troopers the highest paid Troopers in the entire country

I celebrate my Irish heritage by: My dad's grandmother was a Regan from Co. Cork and my mom is a Halloran from Co. Galway. I have tirelessly researched my ancestors so that their hard work and sacrifices will not be forgotten.

What would people would be surprised to know about me.... I have written a book about the formation of the New York State Police - The First State Troopers, A History of the New York State Troopers - and the men that formed the original contingent of Troopers.

Thomas H. Mungeer joined the New York State Police in 1993. After graduating from the State Police Academy, Mungeer was assigned to Troop F in the lower Hudson Valley first to SP Wurtsboro and then SP Liberty. In 1998, Mungeer was one of a select number of Troopers hand-picked for a special, anti-organized crime detail at the Jacob Javits Center in New York City at the request of then-Gov. George

Mungeer worked on that detail for four years, including during the 9/11



attack and clean-up before returning to SP Liberty, where he was assigned to the Highway Task Force. In 2003, Mungeer was elected as the PBA delegate for Troop F and subsequently was elected, in a series of statewide elections, to First Vice President in 2006 and President in 2009, a position he currently holds. In addition, he is currently the Chairman of the National Troopers Coalition, Chairman of the Northeast Regional Troopers Coalition,

Co-Chairman of the New York State Public Employees Conference, Second Vice President of the Police Conference of New York and serves as an Area Vice President with the National Association of Police Organizations and is active with a number of statewide police and public employee organizations. Mungeer has a bachelor's degree in finance from Ithaca College. He is the parent of four children and lives in Sullivan County.

LAURA O'SULLIVAN

Place of Birth: San Francisco, California Where you live: Wilmington, Delaware

Job Title and Description: Captain, Special Operations

Section Commander

In my position, I oversee two lieutenants and 13 sergeants. The units I command are SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics Team), CNT (Crisis Negotiations Team), EOD (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team), MFF (Mobile Field Force), UAS (Unmanned Aircraft Systems Team), POTUS detail-(Presidential Security Liaison/ US Secret Service), MET (Mobile Enforcement Teams), DCS (Drug Control Squad), Safe Streets (P & P team) the Motor Unit, MPU (Mounted Patrol Unit), CSU (Community Services Unit) and TSU (Traffic Services Unit). Special Ops respond to all crisis complaints calling for specially trained officers and support all other tactical and vice operations. We also do a lot of Community Outreach through events during the year and also work with kids at the Police Athletic League. Due to the fact that President Biden lives in our jurisdiction, our teams have an integral part in the protection at his residence or when he is attending events locally.

Why I chose this career: I have wanted to be a police officer all of my life but made my decision when I was in 5th grade. I attended a career day with a local department, joined the police explorers when I was in high school, studied Criminal Justice in college and immediately after attended the police academy for my department. I loved watching police shows on tv while I was growing up and saw many women in the profession like in TJ Hooker, Cagney and Lacey, Charlies Angels and others.

The thought of working in a career where you could make a difference in people's lives by helping them in some of their scariest and toughest moments was a draw for me. In addition, every day brings a different situation and a new challenge out on the streets rather than sitting behind a desk doing the same thing day after day.

Policing was glamorized as a heroic and honorable career, and I still believe that policing is a noble profession today. There is no doubt that being a police officer is my calling. I have no regrets and would do it all again tomorrow.

The proudest moment of my career: This is difficult because I have had so many proud moments in my career. However, I would have to say training for, trying out and becoming the first female SWAT officer on my department was a huge achievement. I was a member on our team for almost 11 years and my last 5 years I was a team leader. We safely executed so many incredible missions due to



our training and cohesion as a team. I only stepped down from the team due to a promotion to $\mathsf{Lt}.$

Just about 4 1/2 years ago, I returned to oversee the team as the Commander of Special Operations to include the SWAT team. There is a mutual respect between myself and all of the team members, especially due to my prior involvement, as well as my knowledge and confidence in the team. There has not been any other female operators on our team since I left, as the physical exercises, stress shoot and drills during tryouts are very demanding. There has only been one other female in the State of Delaware on a SWAT team and that was with the state police several decades ago.

This past year has been our busiest year ever with planned search warrant executions, call outs for armed barricades, protests and presidential protection.

I celebrate my Irish heritage by: I have always been proud to be an Irish American. My mother was born in County Cork, Ireland and took us to Ireland numerous times as I was growing up to visit all of our relatives. When I was younger, my sister and I marched in the NYC parade on St. Patrick's Day with the Ancient Order of Hibernians. I have read and studied about Irish history and culture and studied abroad in 2002 while getting my graduate degree.

I have continued that education through the College of Policing and studied across the United Kingdom.

I'm a proud Irish woman who embraces the Irish culture, traditional meals and Irish whiskey by supporting our local Irish restaurants and bars.

I also support our local departments Pipes and Drums bands and attend our St Patrick Day parades.

What would people would be surprised to know about me.... Most of my colleagues know me as a competitive athlete, soccer player, cyclist, golfer, hiker, bodybuilder and a tough SWAT operator.

While fitness is essential for the job and stress relief, many people would be surprised to know how often I turn to landscape design and gardening for relaxation. Digging in the dirt and planting flowers and trees brings me peace and satisfaction.

aptain O'Sullivan grew up in Toms River, NJ and attended TR High School North. She earned her BS in Criminal Justice from West Chester University and later earned her Graduate degree in Administration of Justice from Wilmington University. Captain O'Sullivan started her career with an internship with the Ocean City Md Police Department in the summer of 1992 as an undercover drug detective. Upon completion, she began the police academy at the New Castle County Police Department at the age of 22.

She worked as a patrol officer, a detective in drugs and domestic violence, patrol sergeant, drill sergeant at the academy, patrol lieutenant, patrol & chiefs executive officer, patrol captain, professional development unit captain and special operations commander. Throughout her career, Captain O'Sullivan has also been involved with honor guard, SWAT team, bike patrol unit and recruitment. She has received numerous trainings and departmental awards throughout her career.

Captain O'Sullivan has attended several leadership schools to include the IACP Leadership in Police Organizations, the FBI National Academy #238, and the Senior Management Institute of Police in Boston Massachusetts #61.

have to be being assigned to the United States Marshals Regional Fugitive Taskforce and being deputized a Special Deputy US Marshal.



What would people would be surprised to know about me.... The one thing that really no one outside my close family knows and people would be surprised to know is

that I love to cook. I create new recipes all the time for my family, I cook all our holiday meals and try to incorporate some of the old family favorites into my weekly menu.

Steve was born in Staten Island New York, the youngest of 3 children. He had a few setbacks medically as he grew up. A major corrective surgery at 16 and was determined to recover so that he would be able to pursue his dream of being a police officer.

In June of 1996 at the age of 24, three months before he was to be married he suffered the devastating loss of his father. Steve's father John was his biggest fan, he supported him in his law enforcement endeavors and he helped in all the planning of his upcoming wedding. Steve married his soul mate Melissa in September of 1996 and they went on a new journey in the state of West Virginia where he became a small town police officer (55 Officers). The removal of this tumor took the hearing in his right ear and he was now single sided deaf. A crushing blow for most people yes, but for Steve a moment that made him more aware of how precious his family and friends were. A moment where he began to appreciate all the good in the world. He faced this challenge like he did everything else head on. With some therapy and some help of hearing devices he got his career back on track.

By age 47 he became the Lieutenant in the Missing Persons Unit which he stayed in that unit until 2020 where he decided to move over to the Internet Crimes Against Children Task force. Steve is very close with his 3 children, 2 are now in college and one a sophomore in high school. His son joined the Army and is a combat medic. He is seeking to become a doctor and help people like his father. His oldest daughter has gotten engaged and he is looking forward to walking her down the aisle. Although life has no always gone according to Steve's plan he has always made the best of what he had and will always be appreciative of the short time we are granted here on earth

She cherishes the police profession and the experiences she has shared, especially with victims of serious personal crime.

While many of her performances are memorial services for fallen officers, she has also personally hosted many concerts for charitable and civic groups. She has used her talent to personally raise thousands of dollars for veterans' groups, children with cancer, the homeless, abused children and many other important charities.

One of her most cherished public appearances took place here in New York City, back in 2006 at the Old Town Hall Theater during the NYPD Pipes and Drums Memorial Concert honoring the many victims and first responders killed on September 11th, 2001. She was honored to return to this memorial concert for both the 10th and 15th anniversaries of this fateful attack.

Pauline resides in Milton MA with her husband Richard and daughter Molly.
