






















Irish Labor Awards Mark Fifteen Years

he 15th Annual Irish Echo Labor Awards are set for the Edison Ballroom in Manhattan on Friday evening, September 12.

The gathering will honor eleven labor leaders for their varied, but in every case distinguished, service to the cause of labor in America. All will be honored as Irish Labor Ambassadors.

And this year we have a record number of women honorees, four in all. They are Mary Jane Bertram, Suzanne Hughes Fuller, Jennifer Flynn and Kansas Asadoorian.

It's fair to say that, over the years, the contribution of the Irish in America to the cause of labor has been nothing less than immense.

Indeed, it could be argued that the American labor movement would not exist at all in its current form without the efforts of standout Irish men and women, champions of labor all, down those years.

Our celebration in the Edison Ballroom will salute a new generation



of Irish American labor leaders who are flying the flag for today's labor movement across the United States.

Battling for the cause of labor has never been an easy road, no matter where in the world it has been waged. Here in the United States, the cause of labor has, it's fair to say, never had a day off. And that includes Labor Day.

Jennifer was on the dance team, Gaelic Society and marched proudly with Iona in the NYC St. Patrick's Day parade.

Soon after graduating from Iona, Jennifer began working at Consolidated Edison Company of New York as a union employee, Local 1-2, Administrative

Clerk in Electric Operations. While working in the union, Jennifer attended graduate school at night to attain her Masters of Science degree in Criminal Justice/Investigations. During her career, she has overcome barriers and has been the "Firsts" in many roles. Over the last eighteen years Jennifer has had increasing responsibilities such as but not limited to; the first employee in what was known as EEO (Equal Employment Opportunity Affairs) to transition from

Union to Management, first section manager focusing on workplace culture of respect and compliance. She was the first woman in Orange & Rockland Utilities to be named Ethics Director since the inception of the position over twenty-five years ago. been donating her hair almost every two years for the last twenty years to organizations that make wigs for children with sickness. The process requires cutting minimum of12 inches of hair that provides hairpieces to children with hair loss from chemotherapy or autoimmune diseases. Jennifer was a 2021 40 under 40 honoree by the Irish Echo.

Finally, Jennifer was recognized by Con Edison by receiving the highest honor that can be bestowed upon by

our employees. She was honored to receive the Living Our Values Award, which is an award that exemplifies the outstanding support and dedication to both her company and her personal life.

Patrick Kelleher


City and State: Dumont, New Jersey.

Current Company and Position: Plumbers Local #24: Assistant Business Manager; Hudson County Building & Construction Trades: President; Hudson County Central Labor Council: Delegate.

Family: Patrick Kelleher is a first-generation Irish American whose roots trace back to two distinct parts of Ireland. His father Denis Kelleher came from Mologhroe in Cullen, County Cork, while his mother Catherine Hughes Kelleher was from Killasser in Swinford, County Mayo. Together, their backgrounds reflect the rich traditions of both the south and west of Ireland, blending the heritage of two culturally vibrant regions. Patrick's family life today includes his son, Liam Denis Kelleher, who is 21 years old and a senior at The Ohio State University, where he is pursuing a degree in finance.

First Job: My first job was as a maintenance mechanic at the Lipton Tea Research Plant in Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey.

What it taught me: That role served as my gateway into the plumber's union. While working on the maintenance team, I was first exposed to plumbing work, including tasks like maintaining steam traps, ionized water tanks, and repairing faucets and traps throughout the research facility. The experience instilled a strong work ethic in me—showing up on time, going above and beyond what was asked, and taking pride in learning a skill



thoroughly. It ultimately paved the way for my entry into the plumber's union.

Best advice you could give someone starting out: Always bring a positive attitude and be punctual. You truly get out of an opportunity what you put into it, so invest your best effort from day one.

Who is your hero and why? My father has always been my hero, providing steadfast support throughout my life. He helped me get a job at the Lipton Tea plant, where I first worked alongside union plumbers—an experience that led me to take the plumbers' exam and join

Plumbers Local 14, laying the foundation for my career.

Patrick Kelleher is currently the Assistant Business Manager at Plumbers Local 24 and serves as the President of the Hudson County Building and Construction Trades. He is also a delegate to the Hudson County Central Labor Council and the Passaic County Building Trades Council. Additionally, Patrick is on the Executive Board of the New Jersey State Building Trades Council. Patrick's career began as a maintenance mechanic at the Lipton Tea research plant in Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey, where he was first exposed to plumbing work. This experience paved the way for his entry into the Plumbers Union.

Born in the Bronx, New York, Patrick grew up in Fairview, New Jersey. Patrick joined the Plumbers Union Local 14 in 1981 and graduated from its apprentice program in 1985. First Job: Babysitting.

What it taught me: Baby sitting taught me a lot about responsibility, time management and communication. Taking care of children requires me to be attentive, patient, and adaptable-skills that continue to help me in both a personal and professional setting. It also

helped me in my ability to make decisions under pressure.

Best advice you could give someone starting out: My advice to someone starting their professional career is to embrace every opportunity to learn and grow while staying true to your work ethic and values. Approach each task with dedication, seek mentorship from seasoned colleagues, and don't shy away from asking questions to deepen your skills and understanding. Building strong relationships with your team and maintaining a commitment to safety and quality will set a solid foundation for long-term success. Stay resilient through challenges, take pride in your craft, and strive for continuous improvement. Above all, show up every day with a willingness to learn something new.

Who is your hero and why? My hero is my son, Jase. Becoming a single mom wasn't easy—especially when I wasn't making enough to give us the life I dreamed of. I wanted more than just to get by. I wanted to give him a safe, comfortable home, vacations to make memories, and a future he could be proud of. He gave me the drive to change our lives, and more importantly, the strength to push myself outside of my comfort zone.

Local 21 Plumbers and Steamfitters. I had some background knowledge from what my dad did when he worked there, and I always knew I was capable of being handy. Still, I went into the job not really knowing what to expect. But I was determined. It wasn't just about a career change—it was about showing my son what resilience looks like. Jase lit the fire in me to chase something better, and because of that first push, I've been able to build a better life not just for him but for all my kids.

ansas Asadoorian is a resilient tradeswoman and licensed cosmetologist whose journey reflects determination, growth, and deep commitment to both her career and her family. A 2009 high school graduate, she went on to attend Paul Mitchell Hair School, earning her cosmetology license while also working day shifts at The Cheesecake Factory in White Plains, New York. After graduating, she began working at Benefit Cosmetics in New Canaan, Connecticut, while raising her son, Jase. With her days starting at 6:30 a.m. and ending well after 7:30 p.m. due to long commutes and evening That's when I decided to apply to responsibilities, she relied on the

support of her parents, who played a crucial role in helping babysit while she worked and attended school. Their support allowed her to push through long, demanding days and stay focused on her goals.

Despite her hard work, she realized she still wasn't earning enough to build the future she envisioned. In 2017, she made the life-changing decision to apply to Local 21 Plumbers and Steamfitters, where her father had once served as a business agent. She was accepted into the apprenticeship program and spent the next five years honing her craft. She stayed after hours on Tuesdays to practice welding, ultimately earning certifications from the United Association for Stick Welding, and Orbital Welding. That same year, she met her now-husband. Peter Asadoorian. who was already a devoted father to Julia and Matthew. They married in September 2022 and have since welcomed three children together: Aspen, Hudson, and Wyatt.

Today, Kansas continues to build a life she's proud of-balancing the demands of a skilled trade with the joys and responsibilities of a growing family. Her story is one of perseverance, passion, and the power of community and family support.



ary Jane was born in Burlington, VT to parents Herman and Margie-Ann Whitenight. As the third of four siblings she had the opportunity to live all over the United States as her father furthered his career as a metallurgical engineer and consultant in the nuclear energy field. The family spent several years living in Tupelo, Miss. Mary Jane was in the 6th grade the first year that enforced busing was begun in the public schools. The anger and outcry during this time puzzled the young Mary Jane and the seeds of a future activist were planted. Her first opportunity to take a stand occurred in High School in Idaho Falls, Idaho and Title 9. Mary Jane participated on the Title 9 committee advocating for

equality in funding for female athletic programs. She also led the battle that allowed the drama, debate and speech teams to earn a school letter just like the boy's football and basketball teams. Unfortunately, she did not benefit from this fight as the change was instituted the year after she graduated.


direct result of their help. advice and guidance. I aspire to emulate them.

The news on health is not good

he Commonwealth Fund approached its 20th presidential election in 2024 with a note of optimism. Although it has long known that much is not well with the American health-care system, it could point to recent improvements and reforms.

The New York and Washington DCbased foundation, which has been around for 107 years and is currently led by Joseph R. Betancourt, M.D., M.P.H, states its purpose is to "promote a high-performing health care system that achieves better access, improved quality, and greater efficiency, particularly for society's most vulnerable, including low-income people, the uninsured, and people of color."

The Commonwealth Fund published at a rate of every three years or so, since 2004, a report it calls "Mirror Mirror," which looks at this country's health-care system alongside several others. The 2024 edition compared the United States with nine other countries.

That most recent "Mirror Mirror," the eighth, says, "The U.S. continues to be in a class by itself in the underperformance of its health care sector. While the other nine countries differ in the details of their systems and in their performance on domains, unlike the U.S., they all have found a way to meet their residents' most basic health care needs, including universal coverage."


This is all the more remarkable given that the U.S. spends more than 16 percent of its GDP on health care whereas in the other countries studied in the report the figure is between 8 percent and 12 percent.

One of the serious deficiencies of our health-care system is its relative weakness as a safety net, and the huge Medicaid cuts in the One Big Beautiful Bill Act are hardly going to help.

"Cuts of this magnitude are not going to discriminate based on whether you have Medicaid or not," said Rachel Nuzum, Vice-President for Policy at the Commonwealth Fund, in a July 17 webinar reported on by

"Mirror Mirror" 2024 analyzed Australia, Canada, France, Germany, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the United States. It did not include Norway, the best performing nation in the previous report, because it exited in 2022 the International Health Policy Survey, which is based on interviews with physicians and patients.

One goal in comparing systems is "to glean insights for U.S. improvement." Underlying its method is an analysis of "70 health system performance measures" in



five areas, which are: "access to care," "care process," "administrative efficiency," "equity" and "health outcomes."

Its most fundamental finding was, "The top three countries are Australia, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom, although differences in overall performance between most countries are relatively small. The only clear outlier is the U.S., where health system performance is dramatically lower."

Not only is the U.S. 10th of the 10 countries, it seriously lags behind in four of those five overall areas studied, whereas the other nine examined "are more alike than different with respect to their higher and lower performance in various domains."

The report says, "Despite spending a lot on health care, the United States is not meeting one of the principal obligations of a nation: to protect the health and welfare of its residents. Most of the countries we compared are providing this protection, even though each can learn a good deal from its peers. The U.S., in failing this ultimate test of a successful nation, remains an outlier."

The best news from an American perspective is that in one of the report's five main areas, "care process," it comes in second behind New Zealand, with Canada and the Netherlands close behind, while Sweden performs comparatively poorly.

The report explains, "Care process looks at whether the care that is delivered includes features and attributes that most experts around the world consider to be essential to high-quality care. The elements of this domain are prevention, safety, coordination, patient engagement, and sensitivity to patient preferences."

It continues, "Strong U.S. performance in the care process domain is the result of the successful provision of preventive services, such as mammograms and flu vaccinations, and an emphasis on patient safety. With respect to preventive care, the U.S. record might reflect the vigorous payfor-performance policies implemented by Medicare and other payers to reward the delivery of these services.

"A concerted focus in the U.S. on patient safety since the beginning of the century has yielded significant reductions in adverse events during hospital stays for heart attack, heart failure, pneumonia, and major surgeries between 2010 and 2019," it adds.

"In the U.S.," on the other hand, according to the Commonwealth Fund's "Mirror Mirror" 2024 report, "lack of affordability is a pervasive problem. With a fragmented insurance system, a near majority of Americans receive their health coverage through their employer. While the ACA's Medicaid expansions and subsidized private coverage have helped fill the gap, 26 million Americans are still uninsured. leaving them fully exposed to the cost drivers in the system. Cost has also fueled growth of private plan deductibles, leaving

about a quarter of the working-age population underinsured. In other words, extensive cost-sharing requirements render many patients unable to visit a doctor when medical issues arise, causing them to skip medical tests, treatments, or follow-up visits, and avoid filling prescriptions or skip doses of their medications."

It adds, "In terms of care availability, U.S. patients are more likely than their peers in most other countries to report they don't have a regular doctor or place of care and face limited options for getting treatment after regular office hours. Shortages of primary care services add to these availability problems."

In the July 17 webinar, Commonwealth Fund's Nuzum and two practicing doctors (Erin Emery-Tiburcio of Rush University Medical Center in Chicago and Harvard Medical School's Sharon K. Inouye) attested to these problems and argued that the coming cuts will make them a good deal worse.

The 2024 edition of "Mirror Mirror" says, "Especially concerning is the U.S. record on health outcomes, particularly in relation to how much the U.S. spends on health care. The ability to keep people healthy is a critical indicator of a nation's capacity to achieve equitable growth. In fulfilling this fundamental obligation, the U.S. continues
